

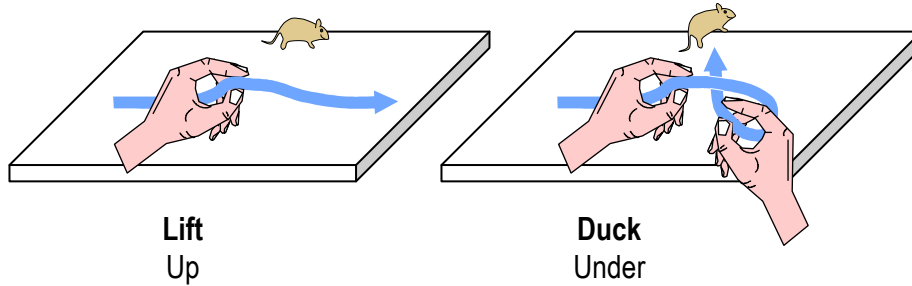


Knot Techniques

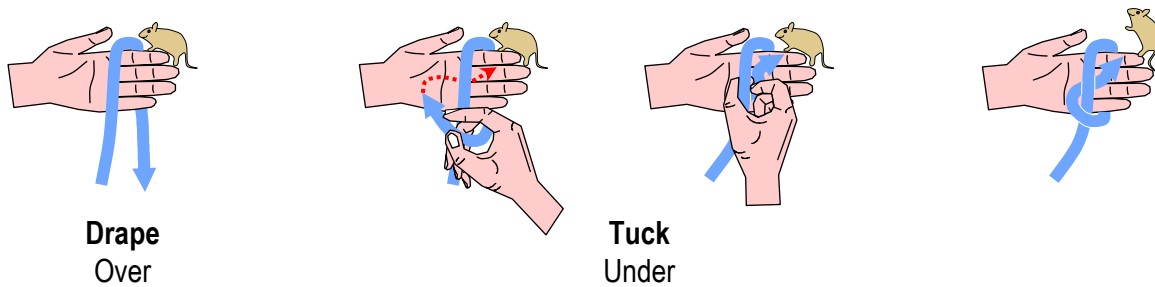
Experiment with each method for tying, moving, and untying knots.



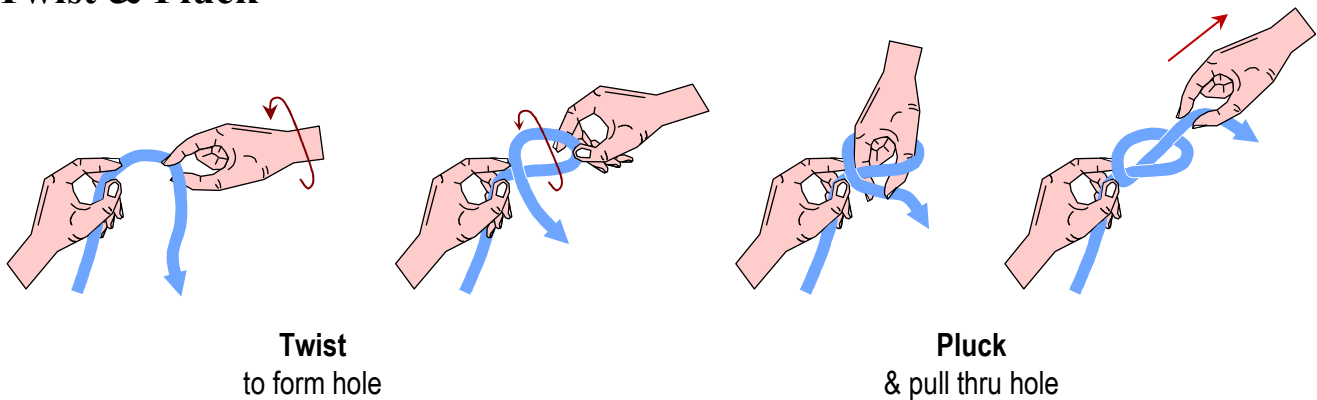
Lift & Duck



Drape & Tuck

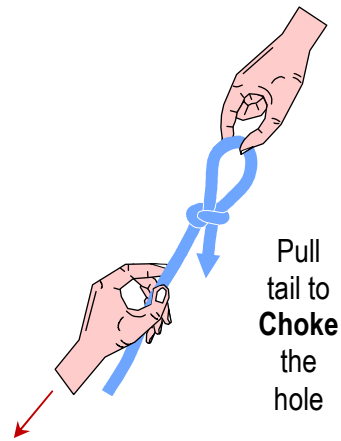
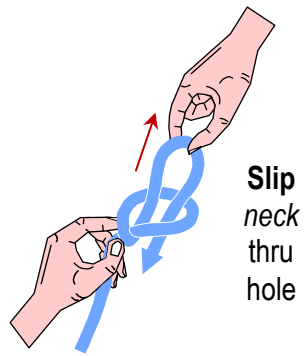


Twist & Pluck



Slip & Choke

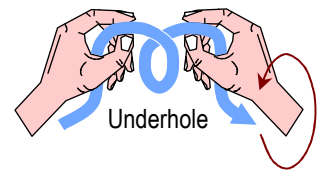
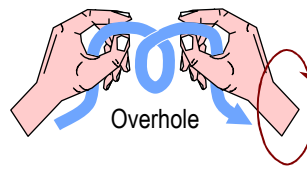
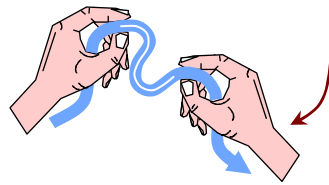
Finishing a knot with a slip loop makes it easier to untie.



To release the slip loop, pull the head.

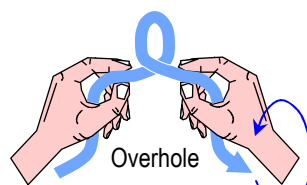
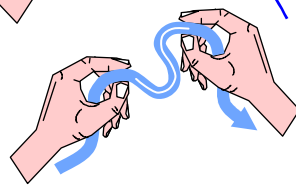
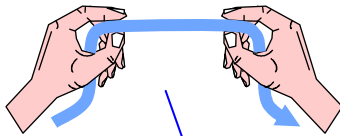
Roll & Flip

To form holes below body



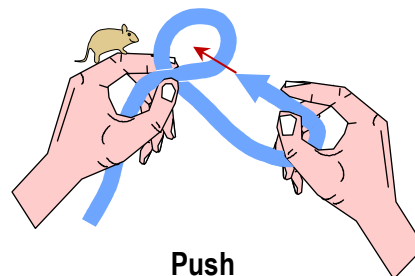
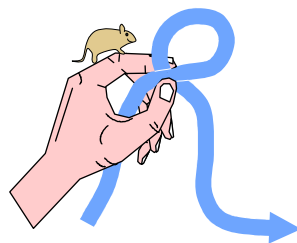

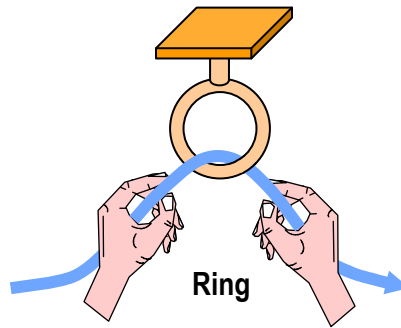

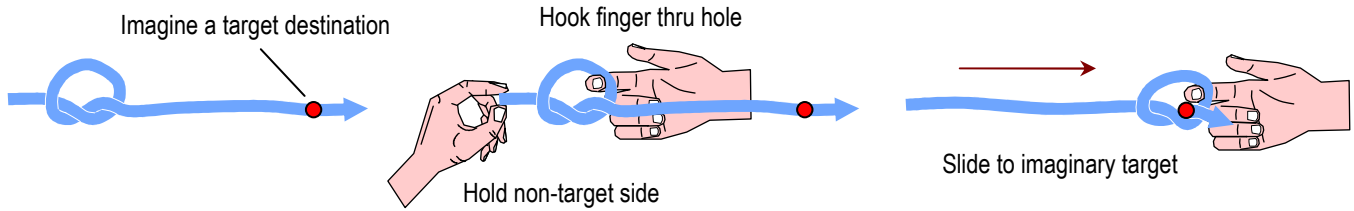

Moving Knots

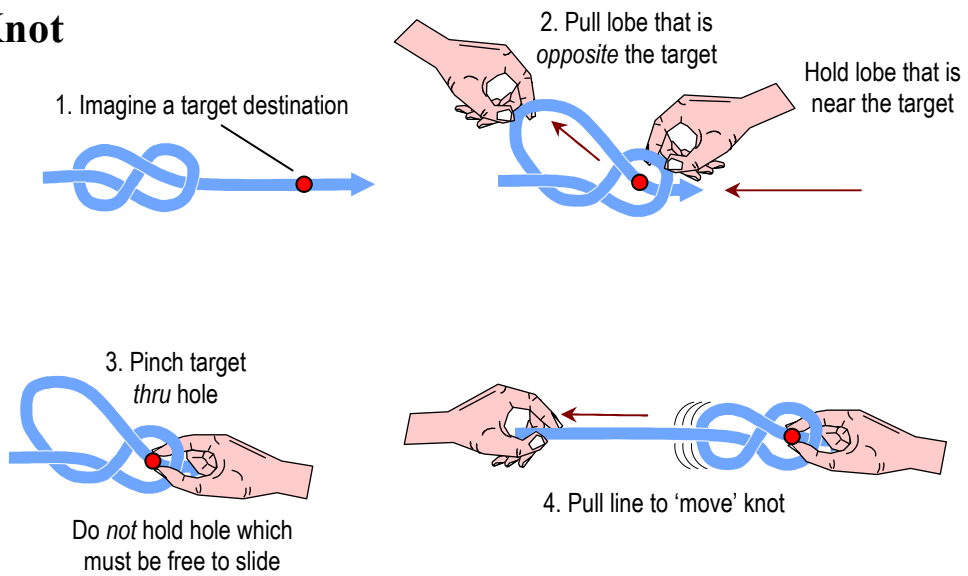
Rather than retying a knot that's in the wrong location, try moving it.

Pull Knot to Target

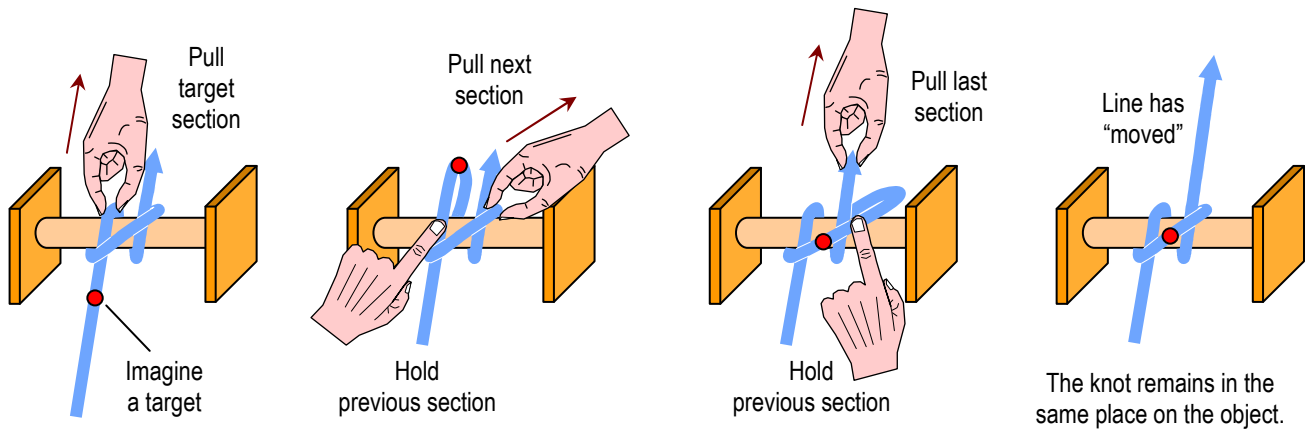


Pull Target to Knot

It seems backwards, but with knots that don't easily move, you may be able to pull the target to the knot.

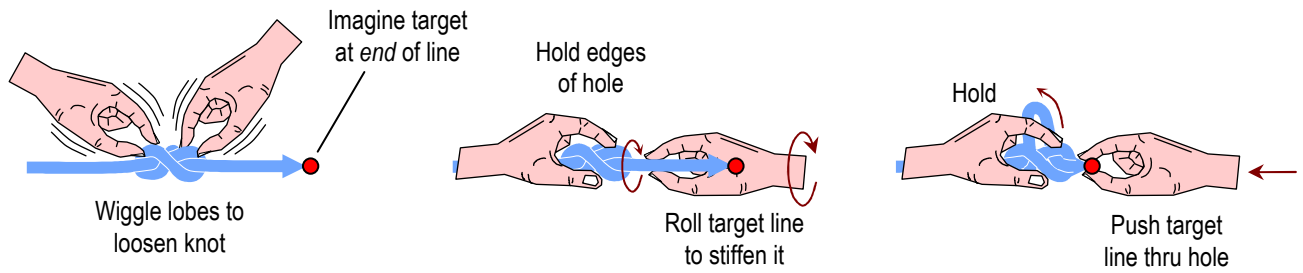

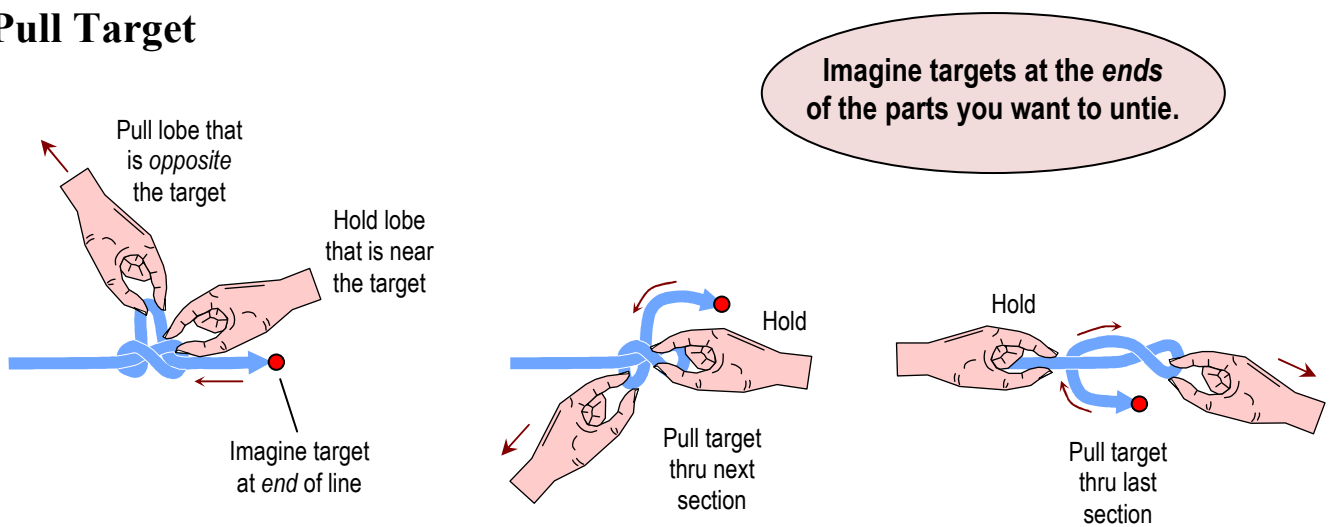
